Volcanoes National Park's Life-Giving Forest

Conserving a Shared Resource for Rwandans and Gorillas

Rwanda's Volcanoes National Park, part of the oldest national park complex in Africa, is the site of one of conservation's greatest success stories—the resurgence of the once critically endangered mountain gorilla. It is a story with chapters still to be written. The rebounding of the gorilla population has led to conflict between gorillas and farmers and between gorillas themselves, whose growing population has outgrown the park.
